## NEWS FROM THE ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

The RHS Hampton Court Flower Show is taking place in early July. The show is open to RHS members only on  $6^{th}$  and  $7^{th}$  July. It is open to the public between  $8^{th} - 11^{th}$  inclusive.

As some of you may already be aware, for the first time ever the RHS Chelsea Flower Show will be held in September instead of May because of the uncertainties surrounding the Covid 19 pandemic. The dates of the 2021 show are 21-26 September and it will be held, as usual, in the grounds of the Royal Hospital. If you can't or don't wish to attend in person there will be a virtual RHS Chelsea again. The first in 2020 was enjoyed by people from 138 different countries.

#### NEWS FROM THE NORFOLK AND NORWICH HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The next NNHS Zoom talk takes place on Monday 29 March 2021. The intriguing title is "The Gardens of North Korea". The speaker is Neil Miller, Head Gardener at Hever Castle. This is the second talk supporting the gardeners' charity "Perennial".

The third talk in the series is on Monday 26 April 2021. It will be a virtual tour of West Green House Gardens in Hampshire with Gareth Manning, Vice President of the Chartered Institute of Horticulture.

These talks are free for members of the NNHS and Members of Affiliated Societies - one of which is Blofield & District Gardening Club.

The NNHS has supplied a helpful guide to joining a Zoom meeting – <u>attached to the covering e-mail</u>. It is reasonably easy and straightforward. Importantly, you don't need to register for a Zoom account to join a meeting. Also you don't need a camera turned on, you can just join in audio mode. Some people did this for the February talk which was joined by nearly 130 people across Norfolk.
